


# tales' tip

Writing can be very motivating. When children WRITE their own words, in whatever style they can, they start to see the connection between the spoken and written word. Encourage your children to write or make their own marks, on their drawings, your grocery list, or on a greeting card. ... All of this helps them get ready to learn how to read. (adapted from Storytimes for Everyone! Book)

## activity

Use pots or bowls to make snow castles on a snowy day! You can use mud or dirt on warm days. Add some food coloring to the snow in order to make your creation colorful! Try creating a snow family using different sized cups. Potato head pieces can be a great addition for bringing your snow family to life!
