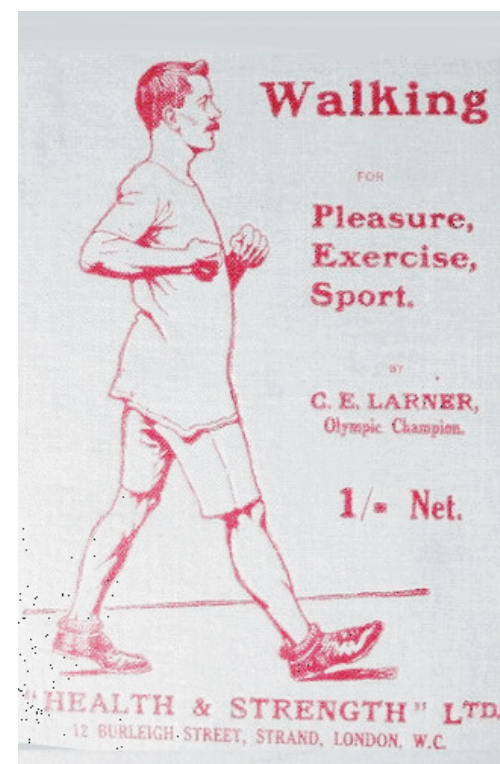


## Walking for Sport

Though race walking is an Olympic sport, it seems that much of the American athletic community does not measure it with the same seriousness as other sports. For example, sports commentator Bob Costa once compared race walking to “a contest to see who could whisper the loudest”. All joking aside, there are athletes all over the world in training to fast walk their way to gold.

Once called “heel and toe walking” for the strict standards placed on the gait, this sport gained widespread popularity after the Civil War. Competitors were of all races, creeds, ages and genders, and all were fast walkers. In 1884, there was a race in Louisville and the competitors, all African American men, fast walked in a two-day event for a total of about 100 miles each.



A front-page article in the *Louisville Courier Journal* in 1888 was focused on the training and health habits of several winning pedestrians. A Spanish champion featured in the article advised a diet comprised of fruits, vegetables and lean meats, while an American champion with a similar record seemed to favor mutton, steaks and chops, followed by Bass ale. Though it may not seem the healthiest diet, the American athlete claimed to run for two hours each day, and could fast walk at a clip of nine miles per hour. In a single race (over several days), he totaled 531 miles.

One of the champions of the sport was a man named C. G. Hubbell from Boone County. Though it's unclear where he began his training as a fast walker, he moved from our area around the turn of the century and was

at the height of his athletic fame after relocating to Pennsylvania. It was in Carlisle, PA, in 1907 that Hubbell was engaged in a curious exhibition race. The day after Christmas, a local roller-skating rink advertised the race between “Champion Heel and Toe Walker of Boone County, Kentucky: C. G. Hubbell” and Mr. Frank Herman, who was slated to compete on roller skates. The outcome is lost to history, but kudos to the confident Mr. Hubbell, whose career continued.

Two years later, Hubbell issued a challenge to anyone who was interested in the sport to join him on a fast walk. The goal was to raise interest and awareness in the sport rather than focusing purely on the competition aspect. He proposed a race from five to twenty-five miles (challenger's choice) in a public space, where all could attend, admission-free. His crown was lost in 1909 to Charles Collins, who outpaced Hubbell's nine-miles-per-hour pace by completing a 13.6 mile race 15 minutes ahead.

## Boone Innovation Lab Spotlight Digitize Your Old Photos & Media

Easily preserve your memories! The Media Conversion Station in the Boone Innovation Lab (BIL) at the Main Library is equipped with technology to create digital copies of a wide variety of media including the following:

- 8 mm or Super 8 film
- VHS videotapes (regular or compact)
- Mini DV tapes
- Video8, Hi8 or Digital8 tapes
- Vinyl records
- Audio cassettes
- Slides or negatives
- Printed photographs
- 3.5 inch floppy disks
- CDs or DVDs (copy and/or burn)

### Things to Consider

A reservation is needed to use the Media Conversion Station. Keep the following in mind when determining how much time you will need to reserve.

- Converting 8 mm and Super 8 reels can take ten times the length of the recording. For example, a three-minute film can take 30 minutes to convert.
- All other videotapes and non-digital sound media are converted at-speed, or the exact time of the original recording. CDs or DVDs can be copied at a slightly faster speed.
- Only one video or sound media can be converted at a time. But slides or photos can be converted while the video or sound is converting.

### Before You Arrive

Be sure to bring a flash drive or external hard drive to store your media after conversion. Typically, you will need at least 4 gb of space so we recommend 8 gb or more of capacity. If needed, a 16 gb flash drive can be purchased at the Library for \$5. In addition, CDs and DVDs (without sleeves or cases) are available for \$1 each.

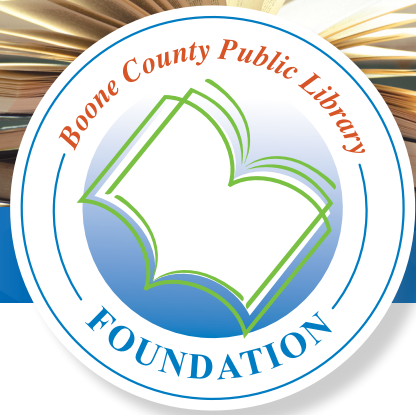

#### Robert Sankner

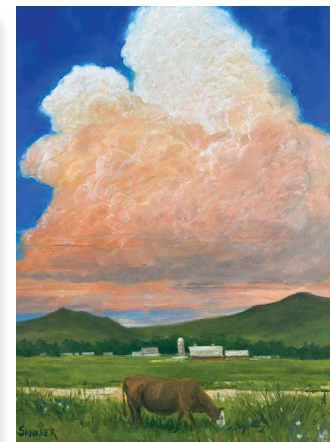

In 1973, he completed a Fine Art degree at the Newark School of Fine Art and Industrial Art where he learned how to work with different media, found his niche in painting and drawing, and began developing his own style through studying artwork from artists like Andrew Wyeth, Jim Dine, Andy Warhol and Franz Kline.

Born and raised in Carteret, New Jersey, Robert joined the U.S. Army in 1975 serving 24 years in Texas, Oklahoma, Germany and Afghanistan. Throughout his military career, he continued to create and exhibit art locally and in army-wide competitions. He was a member of the Army Art team and produced over a hundred pieces documenting army activities in Panama in 1992, which are now part of the U.S. Army Center of Military History Army Art Collection.

Today, Robert lives in Hamilton, Ohio and works full-time on his art career. He takes his inspiration from nature and his experiences around the world. Robert believes that his talents and abilities are a gift from God to provide a means for people to appreciate the wonders of the world we live in.
