

Early Literacy Tips, Activities & More

Be sure to **READ** factual books with your young children. Follow their interests, whether in a particular animal, in how things work, in trains, or in anything else that piques their curiosity. Supporting their curiosity goes a long way in encouraging a love of learning. **ECRR Tip Cards**

TALK

Pretend to have a conversation between a bee and a bear! What would they talk about? What would they sound like? This stretches imagination and helps practice the letter sounds that are more difficult.

WRITE

Draw bumblebee paths with your child, and have them trace over the paths with chalk or bright markers. Tracing helps develop the fine motor skills in the hand that are used for writing. Following a path will also help increase hand-eye coordination.
