PLAY

Make a castle out of blocks. Take turns being the knight defending the castle or dragon who's come to knock it down. When your child pretends to be different characters. they have the experience of "walking in someone else's shoes," which helps teach the important moral development skill of empathy.

TALK

Help your child put on a play based on a fairy tale. Read the story, then act it out together. This process helps your child to make the connection between spoken and written language.
